THREE DAYS IN lahoma City



>> DAY 1: OKC Memorial, Bricktown

DAY 2: Stockyards, OKCMoA

MORNING – Begin the morning with a driving tour of **Oklahoma City** that gives an overview of the downtown area and the revitalization that has occurred over the past few years (allow 2 hours).

AFTERNOON - Arrive at the Oklahoma City National Memorial & **Museum** which honors the 168 lives lost, and those lives that were changed forever, by the bombing of the **Murrah Federal Building** on April 19, 1995. Visit the Outdoor Symbolic Memorial with the Field of Empty Chairs, the Gates of Time, Reflecting Pool, and Survivor Tree before a self-guided tour of the indoor museum. The museum takes us through the days, months,

> and years that followed the bombing (allow 2 hours). Next, visit the Blue **Sage Studio** where a demonstration of glass blowing shows us the process that transforms molten glass to a piece of art (allow 1.5 hours).

EVENING – Check into one of Oklahoma City's many hotels before enjoying dinner in the **Bricktown Entertainment District**. This historic warehouse district was built in the early 1900s when bricks were an abundant source of building material. The warehouses sat empty for years until a revitalization of the area developed this into a major entertainment district known today as Bricktown.



MORNING - Tour Historic Stockyards City, a western district which is the largest stocker/feeder cattle market in the world. Walk the catwalk above the cattle pens where the livestock are held for auctions on Mondays and Tuesdays (allow 1.5 hours). Next. head downtown to the **Red Earth Museum** to learn about Oklahoma's Native American heritage. View artifacts along with traditional and contemporary Indian artwork (allow 1 hour). The **Red Earth Festival** is held in Oklahoma City each June and brings together tribes from across the continent for dance competitions as they

>> DAY 3: Cowboys & Western Heritage

MORNING – Visit the National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum

to see works by master artists such as Charles Russell, Frederic Remington and Albert Bierstadt. The museum complex also contains Prosperity Junction, a turn-of-the-century western town reproduction, a gallery dedicated to famous western performers, a gallery honoring the American cowboy,



and a gallery focusing on rodeos. Lunch is included at the museum's cafe, **Dining on Persimmon Hill**, before departing the museum (allow 2.5 hours).

AFTERNOON – Walk into the **Oklahoma History Center**, where

the large atrium gives a wonderful view of Oklahoma's state Capitol building. Enjoy a storyteller that brings to life a significant character from Oklahoma's history. On a self-guided tour of the museum, find Smithsonian-quality exhibits on American Indians, Route 66, the Dust Bowl, oil and gas exploration, aviation, and much more in five different galleries (allow 2 hours).
