Thank you for being courteous to other park visitors

- Park quiet hours are from 11pm until 6am, 7 days a week.
- All pets must be caged or on a leash not to exceed 10 feet. Please don't leave pets unattended as this causes stress to the animal and other park users.
- Glass containers are prohibited in swimming areas.
- Follow fishing regulations set forth by Oklahoma Dept. of Wildlife Conservation. Please clean your fish and dispose of remains in designated areas or receptacles.
- Please don't intrude on other camper's sites. Respect their home away from home.

Thank you for respecting and caring for park resources

- Metal detectors are NOT allowed in the park.
- Please do not litter. Litter should be disposed of in the appropriate bins and receptacles.
- Camp and park in designated areas only.
- Check with park manager before collecting firewood.
- Please don't remove or disturb plants, animals or other natural features from the park.
- Grey water and sewage must be disposed of only in the disposal facilities (dump stations) provided.
- No walking, climbing or writing on any archeological or cultural resource in the park.
- Gathering of nuts, fruits, berries or other natural products for personal consumption is prohibited, unless authorized by park use permit.
- Hunting is prohibited on state park property except in designated bow hunting and waterfowl areas of Lake Thunderbird.
- Fires should be lit and maintained in designated areas or fire rings. Please do not leave a fire unattended and extinguish it properly when leaving.
- Don't wash food, clothing dishes or other property at water hydrants or on the lakeshore.

To ensure your safety

- Upon arrival, check in the park office for any special rules or regulations.
- Never hike alone. Take along sunscreen, insect repellent or allergy medication.
- Never swim alone. There are no lifeguards at the swim beaches. Swim at your own risk and obey all water safety rules.
- Have a first-aid kit on hand.
- Recognize and avoid poisonous plants.
- Observe all warning signs.
- Familiarize yourself with the area.
- For all emergencies call 911. Norman Regional Hospital is the nearest health facility.
- Stay alert to changes in the weather. Be prepared for inclement weather. In case of severe weather (hail, tornadoes, etc.) take cover in the nearest permanent park building such as a comfort station or park office.
- Familiarize yourself with any poisonous insects and snakes in the area. Use insect and tick repellent.
